

There are only a handful of major collectors in LA, but there are more places to see art in the city than ever before



### **Marciano Art Foundation**

he Chinese artist and activist Ai Weiwei is taking over Los Angeles with three concurrent shows (*see right*). **The Marciano Art Foundation**, a gallery set up by brothers Maurice and Paul Marciano, co-founders of the Guess Ai Weiwei, Life Cycle (2018)

fashion brand, and set in a former Scottish Rite Masonic temple, is showing numerous works including *Life Cycle* (2018), a giant boat made from bamboo which references the makeshift vessels used by refugees to reach Europe. Until March 3, 2019.

#### Jeffrey Deitch Gallery

N ew York dealer Jeffrey Deitch is inaugurating his new 15,000sqft gallery on North Orange Drive in Hollywood with a survey of Ai Weiwei's work including an installation of 6,000 wooden stools (*below*) first seen at the Gropius Bau in Berlin. The September opening marks a return to the city for Deitch, who previously served as director of the Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles but resigned in 2013 following criticism of his emphasis on pop culture shows.





#### Paramount Studios

News that Frieze is launching an art fair in Los Angeles was greeted with scepticism by the art world (one website declared the event "dead on arrival"). Fairs in the city have come, done poorly, and gone. Still, if anyone can crack Los Angeles, it's Frieze, now part-owned by the Hollywood sport and entertainment conglomerate Endeavor. The talent agency may be able to persuade its high-profile clients to attend the inaugural Frieze LA at Paramount Picture Studios in Hollywood (February 14-17, 2019). Whether they buy any art remains to be seen.

# UTA Artist Space

As more artists sign with Hollywood talent agencies, firms are beginning to encroach on the work of art dealers. None more so than United Talent Agency, which opened UTA Artist Space, a gallery in LA, two years ago. It has just moved to a new 4,000sqft gallery in Beverly Hills, designed by Ai Weiwei. The artist is
